What are the Christian symbols?



The cross is the main symbol. It reminds Christians that Jesus died on the cross to save them.

The dove is the symbol of the Holy Spirit and peace.



The fish symbol was created using the Greek letters which spell out ICHTHUS: Jesus Christ God's Son Saviour.

Key Dates

B.C stands for the English phrase "before Christ,"

A.D is a Latin phrase: anno domini ("in the year of the Lord"—the year Jesus was born).

Who is the Founder of Christianity?

Jesus Christ was crucified in Jerusalem He was the founder of Christianity.

Jesus Christ is the Son of God. He came to earth to teach about love and fellowship. He represents the person that all Christians must strive to be.

Christians are people who believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, and who follow his teachings and those of the Christian churches that grew up after his death. Christians believe that Jesus rose from the dead and appeared to his disciples (followers) to show everyone that there is another life with one, eternal, loving God. Christians get their name from Jesus Christ who is God's son.

What do Christians believe?

Christians believe that Jesus Christ was the Son of God and that:

God sent his Son to earth to save humanity from the consequences of its sins

Jesus was fully human, and experienced this world in the same way as other human beings of his time

Jesus was tortured and gave his life on the Cross (At the Crucifixion)

Jesus rose from the dead on the third day after his Crucifixion (the Resurrection)

Christians believe that Jesus was the Messiah promised in the Old Testament.

Christians believe that there is only one God, but that this one God consists of 3 "persons"

God the Father

God the Son

The Holy Spirit

Christians believe that God made the world.

Where do Christians worship?

The Christian place of worship is called a Church

How is Christianity similar to other religions?

Christianity shares a number of beliefs and practices with other religions,

particularly [Judaism](#) and [Islam](#). With Judaism and Islam, Christians believe in one God, who created the universe and all that is in it. All believe that this God is active in history, guiding and teaching his people.

What are the 10 Commandments? (From the Holy Bible)

1. Thou shalt have no other gods before me
2. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image
3. Thou shalt not take the name of the LORD thy God in vain
4. Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy
5. Honour thy father and thy mother
6. Thou shalt not kill
7. Thou shalt not commit adultery
8. Thou shalt not steal
9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour
10. Thou shalt not covet anything that is thy neighbour's
